What drew me to Veterinary Nephrology and Urology?

In veterinary school at UC Davis in the early 1970's, I was troubled by how the kidney's role in acid base balance (specifically the reabsorption of bicarbonate) was explained to us and by my failure to understand exactly what was meant by the comment, made by one of our favorite instructors, that lactated Ringer's solution was alkalinizing because the "lactate was converted to bicarbonate." It took me years to finally understand what actually was behind those processes. However, what really drew me to nephrology was meeting Dr. Dennis Chew when I arrived as a medicine resident at Ohio State University in 1977. I was drawn to his infectious enthusiasm for the subject and we soon began collaborating on clinical studies.
